

7. In March of what year was the Great Gale that wreaked havoc across the Dogger Bank fishing grounds of the North Sea, resulting in the loss of around thirty Hull fishing smacks and more than 200 Hull seamen in a single day?
8. What was the middle name of Hull-born John Dykes who composed the music for the hymns 'Eternal Father, Strong to Save', 'Holy, Holy, Holy' and 'Nearer, my God, to Thee'?
9. Which Hull food retailing company was initially established in 1978 as Grindells Butchers Ltd., with a shop at 119 Greenwood Avenue?
10. What was the name of the small Hessle-based publishing company which published Philip Larkin's break-through collection *The Less Deceived* in 1955?
11. Which Hull-born poet, memorialised in Westminster Abbey's Poets' Corner in 1799, has a street near the Hull History Centre named after him?
12. In which year did Hull FC (at their fourth attempt) win the rugby Challenge Cup for the first time?
13. What was the originally intended name of Hull's Pearson Park?

- 15.** Who, in 1332, was appointed Hull's first Mayor?
- 16.** In which year was Trinity House founded?

- 20.** Which monarch provided £18,000 towards the building of the town's Citadel, completed towards the end of 1543?
- 21.** Who refused Charles I entry into Hull on 23 April 1642 in what has been called the first overt act of the English Civil War?
- 22.** Name the great 17th century metaphysical poet born in the rectory at Winestead on 31 March 1621, and later elected Member of Parliament for Kingston-upon-Hull.
- 23.** In which year did Holy Trinity Church officially become a Parish Church in its own right?
- 24.** What was the official name of the Hull Dock Company?
- 25.** On which day of the year was much-loved local comedian (widely regarded as 'the comedians' comedian') Norman Collier born?

- 32.** What was the original name of the vessel launched in Hull in 1782 and later named the Bounty (famously associated with Fletcher Christian and Captain William Bligh)?

- 33.** What was the Christian name of the Reckitt who founded the company that would become RB (Reckitt Benckiser)?
- 34.** What was the Christian name of the Wilson who in 1840 founded the Hull-based Wilson Line shipping company, which became the largest privately owned shipping line in the world?

- 41.** Name the theatre company (based in Dean Clough Mill, Halifax) founded by Hull-born Hessle Roder Barrie Rutter OBE.
- 42.** Name the Hull Vikings speedway rider who in 1979 won the World Championship for a record-breaking sixth time.
- 43.** In which year was The Deep opened to the public for the first time?
- 44.** Who holds the record for the most career tries (207) for Hull KR?
- 45.** When it was built, the Humber Bridge was the longest single-span bridge in the world, and held that position for 17 years, but in which year was it officially opened?
- 46.** Which local church had its steeple pulled down by Henry VIII in 1540 because it obstructed his view from Suffolk Palace (at the corner of where today Alfred Gelder Street and Lowgate meet)?
- 47.** Name the Hull-born explorer who set out to discover a north-west passage in 1631, and who died in poverty in Whitby in July 1635, shortly after publishing a record of his voyages.

- 48.** What type of vessel was recovered off Greenland in 1613 by Andrew Barker, an Elder Brother of Hull's Trinity House, and is now on display in one of the rooms at Trinity House?
- 49.** What was the name of the principal entry to the old town, where Charles I was refused entry in April 1642?
- 50.** What was the name and rank of Sir John Hotham's son who was beheaded at Tower Hill, London, the day before Sir John himself was executed there in the same manner having been found guilty of 'traitorously betraying the trust imposed upon him by Parliament'?
- 51.** What was the name of the sculptor who created the equestrian statue of King William III (King Billy) that stands in Marketplace?
- 52.** Name the Hull-born son of a whaling merchant, who was appointed Surgeon to Hull Infirmary, and subsequently became the first Chairman of the Hull School Board. He had schools in Bean Street and on Orchard Park named after him.
- 53.** The last criminal to be publicly executed in Hull was John Rogerson, who had been found guilty of counterfeiting coins, but in what year of the 18th century was he hanged?
- 54.** What was the name of the Hull-born builder and craftsman who became known as 'Pugin's Master Builder', and was one of the Rothschild family's favourite builders? (He also built the William Wilberforce monument, which now stands outside Hull College)
- 55.** In October 1854, during a royal visit, the Mayor of Hull, Henry Cooper, was knighted by Queen Victoria (to the delight of the gathered crowd) in a seemingly impromptu ceremony. But where did this ceremony take place?
- 56.** Hull-born Charles Henry Bromby (the son of John Healey Bromby, vicar of Holy Trinity Church) was appointed Bishop of which island state of Australia in 1864?
- 57.** What was the name of Hull's third dock, constructed after The Dock and the Humber Dock?
- 58.** Name the Scottish-born scientist whose research at Hull University would eventually lead to the development of the liquid crystal industry.

- 64.** Name the local band whose single 'Good Technology', released on their own Self Drive label, was taken up and championed by the BBC's John Peel in 1983.
- 65.** Name the person, regarded by many as a local legend, who gave up his job as a shipping clerk for J. H. Fenner Ltd. in 1984 and became the owner of the world-renowned New Adelphi Club (De Grey Street).

- 71.** Name the local ska band Roland Gift was a member of before he found fame singing with Fine Young Cannibals.
